THE FLAG OF THE SALVATION ARMY

In 1865 the reverend William Booth began his work in East London. He tried to help the submerged tenth, poor people with no hope and no help. In 1878 the name of his group became "The Salvation Army". The primary aim of the enthusiastic people of the Salvation Army was to preach the gospel of Jesus Christ to men and women untouched by common religious efforts.

Mrs Booth designed a flag and the first corps flag was presented by her to the Coventry Corps in September 1878.

The colours of this flag are symbolizing:

RED... the Blood of Jesus Christ. He gave a supreme sacrifice. In what this sacrifice meant the Salvationist tries to spread the Gospel.

YELLOW... the Fire of the Holy Spirit. The Salvationist is of opinion that he cannot do his task without the help of the Holy Spirit.

"They're helpless nobodies", our enemies boast. But they forget that with us comes the almighty Holy Ghost.

BLUE... the purity. The Salvationist thinks that we must do our utmost for the people around us. We can help the people in the best way if our life is pure, clean. We are total-abstainers.

THE STAR... shining in the night. Many men and women are without hope. Destitute, helpless and poor people is waiting for a ray of light. Our Blind School in Nassau therefore is somewhat symbolic, like it is sung:

Till the day dawns and the shadow flees away
Guide me, oh my great Redeemer,
Keep me faithfull all the way
Till the day dawns and the shadow flees away.

It is a flag of service to millions who were down to the ground.
It is a flag of an open door to homeless people.
It is a flag of an opportunity to many fine young people who want to
serve their neighbour at next door and far off.
It is a flag of brotherhood of many men and women from all different
countries, races, upbringing.
It is a world flag of high ideals !
